

Meeting was called to order by Mr. Emami at 1:30 p.m.

Self-Introductions

CONSENT CALENDAR

- 1. The Minutes for the June 23, 2021 meeting were approved.
 - Mr. Wheeler motioned to approve the minutes.
 - Mr. Sethuraman seconded the monition.

The Minutes were approved, there was no further discussion.

REGULAR ITEMS

2. Comprehensive Transportation Funding Programs Semi-Annual Review – September 2021 – Charvalen Alacar

Ms. Alacar provided an overview of proposed project adjustments requests for OCTA's September 2021 Comprehensive Transportation Funding Programs (CTFP) Semi-Annual Review.

Ms. Alacar stated that in total, fifty-three project adjustments were being advanced for the TAC, and ultimately OCTA Board consideration and approval. She then provided a brief summary of recommended project adjustments requests, which included:

- 5 timely-use of funds extensions for CTFP projects;
- 2 timely-use of funds extensions for In-Kind O&M;
- 12 timely-use of funds extensions for Local Fair Share allocations;
- 28 timely-use of funds extensions for Senior Mobility Program (SMP) allocations;
- 5 scope changes; and
- 1 transfer of savings

Ms. Alacar noted that staff has observed that while the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic have begun to ease for CTFP projects, SMP continues to be heavily impacted by COVID-19, with twenty-eight of this cycle's fifty-three total project adjustments request coming from this program specifically. Ms. Alacar stated that staff will continue monitoring COVID-19 related impacts to this program in the coming months and specifically during the March 2021 Semi-Annual Review.



Mr. Wheeler motioned to approve the item, and it was seconded by Mr. Stacks. The item passed with no further discussion.

3. 2022 Technical Steering Committee Membership – Joe Alcock

Mr. Alcock presented an overview of proposed 2022 Technical Steering Committee (TSC) membership. He stated that the TSC consist of a total of nine members and memberships is evaluated yearly as terms expire.

He then mentioned that for this year, there were five positions open for appointment including the Chair, Vice Chair, District 1 representative, District 4 representative, and one At-Large representative. He then continued, that in accordance with the Board's approval Guidelines for administering the TSC, the President of the City Engineer's Association of Orange County, the current TAC/TSC Chair, Mr. Emami, and OCTA staff (the Committee) developed these 2022 TSC membership recommendations.

Mr. Alcock stated that consistent with past practices, the current Vice Chair Mr. Shaun Pelletier, from the City of Aliso Viejo, was being recommended to become the Chair. He then stated that Mr. William Galvez, from the City of Santa Ana, was being recommended for the Vice Chair position, and further commented that these recommendations maintained a good balance between north and south Orange County jurisdictions, among the Chair and Vice Chair leadership positions.

Mr. Alcock recommended that Mr. Jake Ngo, from the City of Westminster, for appointment to the first supervisorial district position. Mr. Rudy Emami, from the City of Anaheim, is recommended for appointment to the fourth supervisorial district position. Ms. Fiona Man, from the County of Orange, is recommended for appointment to the open At-Large position.

Mr. Alcock concluded by noting that the Committee was supportive of these requests, and as such they were being advanced for TAC consideration and approval.

Mr. Wheeler motioned to approve the item, and it was seconded by Mr. Sethuraman. The item passed with no further discussion.

4. 2021 Pavement Management Relief Funding Program Overview and Guidelines – Heidi Busslinger

Ms. Busslinger presented an overview of the 2021 Pavement Management Relief Funding Program Overview and Guidelines.



Ms. Busslinger stated that the 2021 Pavement Management Relief Funding (PMFR) Program will be distributed through a formula based on population with a \$200,000 minimum guarantee. No local match is required for this program.

It was shared that the OCTA PMRF guidelines will allow the funds to be used for street pavement preservation, preventive maintenance, rehabilitation, and reconstruction exclusively. In order to streamline the processing of these limited funds, local agencies are asked to limit the number of projects supported by this program. Local agencies can utilize the funding on up to three projects and must submit their project list to OCTA by February 28, 2022.

She stated projects will be submitted to the CTC as they come in. Once approved by the CTC, local agencies will work directly with Caltrans Local Assistance to process the allocation and authorization to proceed documentation to access the funds. Any PMRF funding assigned to any jurisdiction that has not obligated or has not received federal authorization to proceed by July 1, 2023, will return to OCTA to be reprogrammed to priority OCTA projects. She stated this deadline of obligation ensures no funds are lost within Orange County. A city/council resolution will be required as part of the submittal.

7. Staff Comments

Mr. Alcock reported that e-bikes have been growing in popularity in the last couple of years, and there has been growing interest from elected officials in the County along with the media and the public to better understand how these bikes are being used, as well as any challenges local agencies may be experiencing. Staff is developing a survey on e-bikes to help OCTA and the County better understand how these bikes are being used.

The survey will address topics such as uses, enforcement safety, and available facilities among other things. He also shared that Peter Sotherland, the OCTA Active Transportation Coordinator would be the contact to address any questions, concerns, or thoughts on the e-bikes, please.



Mr. Alcock also invited the TAC members to the Pavement Management Relief Funding (PMRF) Program workshop which was held virtually at 3:00 pm, following the TAC meeting.

Ms. Bourgeois asked if the e-bike survey is about programs the cities may be running or issues and concerns regarding privately owned e-bikes.

Mr. Alcock stated this survey is regarding issues and concerns with e-bikes.

Ms. Bourgeoise asked if there has been any discussion extending this to escooters, or is it only limited to the e-bikes.

Mr. Sotherland stated that OCTA will be focusing on e-bikes.

Mr. Sinacori asked if Mr. Alcock can provide Mr. Sotherland email address.

He provided that Mr. Sotherland can be reached at psotherland@octa.net or 714-560-5386

8. Items for Future Agendas

Ms. McWade asked if there is anything about the infrastructure funding bill or how agencies can partner together on major corridors in terms of pavement. She stated she is looking to the group to see if this is an area of interest and/or the change of micro-crunching and what that means for future projects.

Mr. Emami stated that is a good point as there has been change in the process with earmarks being removed, some sort of update will be helpful.

Mr. Alcock stated that the OCTA government relations group can provide an overall update in the next meeting.

Mr. Sethuraman asked if there is any update when the next Bicycle Corridor Improvement Program (BCIP) funding is available.

Mrs. Cardoso stated that at this moment, OCTA does not have the next call planned, but are looking at either 2022 or 2023 to initiate the next call. She stated that she will follow-up once more information is available.



9. Caltrans Local Assistance Update - Oliver Luu

Mr. Luu provided an overview of upcoming California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) and Local Assistance deadlines. He noted the following:

- Deadline to submit allocations and time extensions to District Local Assistance is November 29, 2021, for the January 2022 CTC meeting and January 18, 2022, for the March 2022 CTC meeting.
- Current inactive quarter began on October 1, 2021, and the deadline to submit inactive invoices to Caltrans this quarter is November 22, 2021.
- Cycle 6 of the Active Transportation Program (ATP) meeting is scheduled for November 9, 2021 from 9:30 am to 12:30 pm. He stated that registration information will be placed on the CTC's ATP webpage. He also stated that if your agency plans to apply for Cycle 6 with a project that is on or will impact Caltrans Right of Way, we recommend you start working on the Right of Way Impact Checklist as soon as possible to prevent delay to your application submittal.
- The Clean California Local Grant Program (CCGLGP) is a new grant program whose purpose is to beautify and clean up local streets and roads, tribal lands, parks, pathways, transit centers, and other public spaces. He stated that there is \$296 million dollars in funding for this program and is a three-year competitive statewide program in which projects must be completed and open to the public with funds fully expended by June 30, 2024. He stated there is a technical workshop on November 8, 2021, from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. He also stated the call for projects will be in December 2021.
- LAPM Chapter 10 has been updated to specify how local public agencies may submit evidence of adopting LAPM Chapter 10 for federal A&E contracts. He stated that the deadline for agencies to comply with this requirement is November 15, 2021.
- Upcoming trainings include Federal Aid Series, which includes modules on Getting Your Federal Aid Started, Environmental Requirement, and Procedures for Right of Way Acquisition, Document Submittal for agencies, Excavation and Trenching Safety, Labor Compliance, and the Resident Engineers Academy. He stated that the Federal Aid series and the Resident Engineers Academy are popular courses and so, recommend registering as soon as possible.







Mr. Luu concluded by stating that all local agencies are required to comply with all Title VI requirements


Completing the OC Loop










Frequency of Signal Timing



Zero-Emission Bus (ZEB) Policies

- At least 25% of Low-No funding must go toward non-ZEBs
- 5% of FTA funding must be used for workforce training
- Required ZEB fleet transition plan, similar to California law
