




Measure M2 Environmental Mitigation Program

- Measure M2 is a half-cent sales tax measure passed by Orange County voters in November 2006 for transportation improvement projects
- Allocates funds to acquire open space properties and contributes to habitat restoration projects
- Helps streamline approval process for 13 M2 freeway improvement projects



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- Conservation Plan\* and DraftEnvironmental ImpactReport/Statement:
  - Assess potential environmental impacts
  - Protect natural habitat and valuable animal and plant species in Orange County
- 90-day public comment period (Nov 7 – Feb 6)

\*NCCP/HCP or Conservation Plan: Natural Community Conservation Plan/Habitat Conservation Plan

# Conservation Plan Advantages

- Certainty in Endangered Species Act permitting
- Upfront agreements on impacts and mitigation
- Regional perspective on habitat conservation
- Long-term management and monitoring of habitat quality
- Biological permits for all M2 freeway projects





## What's in the Conservation Plan

- 13 projects, 13 species, and Preserve activities (e.g., road maintenance, restoration, etc.)
- Conservation targets, biological goals, and objectives based on freeway project impacts
- Conservation strategy designed to complement other conservation lands within the County



# What's in the Conservation Plan

- Acquired Preserves/funded restoration projects
- Preserve management and monitoring
- Plan implementation, permit assurances, and funding



# Conservation Strategy



Primary components include:

- Preserve acquisitions
- Restoration projects
- Avoiding and minimizing environmental impacts
- Addressing streambed impacts

- Obtain public comments and finalize NCCP/HCP
   and EIR/EIS
- Outline future property management plan
- Complete regulatory permitting processes
- Review program expenditures/revenues to determine potential future funding needs





- Complete acquisition and restoration expenditures
- Draft NCCP/HCP, EIR/EIS, and RMPs
  - Obtain public comments and finalize NCCP/HCP and EIR/EIS
  - Execute implementing agreement
  - Record property protection instruments for Preserves
  - Outline management plan
- Complete regulatory permitting processes
- Review program expenditures/revenues to determine potential future funding needs



- Measure M2 Environmental Mitigation Program meets NCCP and HCP requirements for mitigation
- Additional targeted restoration will be needed
- Endowment and long-term property management agreements must be established
- Future policy decisions on remaining M2 Mitigation Program revenues
