Stakeholder engagement

Working group

- Reps from agencies, institutions, schools, districts, others
- Strong support for countywide program led by OCTA + OCHCA.

School and district surveys

- Schools do SRTS work even without formal program.
- Coordination and capacity building are most needed.



3: Needs assessment

Tiering schools for critical need.

Schools with less supportive context for walking/biking to school scored higher.



Safety

Many bike/ped collisions

Wide roadways

High traffic volumes



Equity

High obesity rate

High Healthy Places Index score

Many people of color



Community need

Few existing/planned bicycle facilities

Limited sidewalk networks

Many children under 18

Tiers help identify sliding scale of resources needed.

Tier 1 – Sensitive

 Schools are in the highest-need contexts and requiring most intensive SRTS support. (174 schools)

Tier 2 – Swing


 Schools with moderate need that may require general SRTS support. (264 schools)

Tier 3 – Supportive

 Schools with the lowest level of need that would benefit from basic SRTS resources. (184 schools)

Tiers help identify where help is most critically needed.

Tiers are assigned within each school type



4: Action Plan

Key concepts and actions

Framework

- 4 recommendations
- 11 supporting strategies
- 23 actions, including 4 priority actions



Recommendation 1/ Establish a countywide Safe Routes to School Program.

Strategies

- Establish ongoing program funding.
- Evaluate progress toward achieving goals.

Priority action

Identify program managing agency and coordinators.

Recommendation 2/ Create and sustain lasting partnerships.

Strategies

- Build and sustain support coalitions.
- Empower schools to take on new programming.

Priority action

Provide assessment tools to schools and districts to help determine their readiness, capacity, and needs.

Recommendation 3/ Develop a culture of safety.

Strategies

- Student safety education and encouragement
- Community-wide behavior change

Priority action

Compile a record of institutional knowledge to date and ensure that SRTS program staff are aware of local and national best practices.

Recommendation 4/ Fund and build safe streets.

Strategies

- Identify infrastructure improvements
- Direct infrastructure funding to schools
- Include SRTS in local and countywide plans

Priority action

Provide districts and individual schools with a funding toolkit containing funding opportunities and directions to apply for that funding.
