3. Orange County Council of Governments' Financial Report

A motion was made by Board Member Lautenschleger, seconded by Board Member Glaab, and declared passed by those present, to approve the Orange County Council of Governments' financial report.

4. State Legislative Update

A motion was made by Board Member Lautenschleger, seconded by Board Member Glaab, and declared passed by those present, to receive and file as an information item.

5. Amendment #1: Memorandum of Understanding Agreement with California State University Fullerton for Fiscal Year 2012-2013 Professional Services: Center for Demographic Research

A motion was made by Board Member Lautenschleger, seconded by Board Member Glaab, and declared passed by those present, to authorize the Executive Director to execute Amendment No. 1 to the Memorandum of Understanding Agreement C-1-2841 with the Center for Demographic Research for the second year of the three-year Memorandum of Understanding which provides for demographic research and deliverables for Fiscal Year 2012-13.

7. Update: 2012 Regional Transportation Plan/Sustainable Communities Strategy and Program Environmental Impact Report

Dave Simpson, Executive Director, reported that the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) has taken action on the 2012 Regional Transportation Plan/Sustainable Communities Strategy (SCS) and Program Environmental Impact Report. Staff expects that the Air Resources Board will make their decision on the document in May 2012.

Fred Galante, General Counsel, commented that with the adoption of SCS, the Memorandum of Understanding between OCCOG and SCAG for the preparation of the SCS will be terminated.



7. (Continued)

Chairman Herzog commented that staff is working with the Technical Advisory Committee and LSA Associates on a "lessons learned" document for work on the next SCS in 2016

No action was taken on this receive and file item.

8. Orange County Council of Governments Federal Grants: Proposed Multi-Year Funding Program

Dave Simpson, Executive Director, provided an overview of the multi-year funding plan for the available federal grant funds, which includes expanding the Orange County Bikeway Planning Program throughout the County.

Public comments were received from Michele Martinez, representing The Alliance for a Healthy Orange County, who encouraged the Board to support this item and thanked Board Member Nelson for leading the way in improving bikeway systems in Orange County. Additionally, Ms. Martinez encouraged the support complete streets in throughout the County.

Public comments were received from Pauline Chow, representing Safe Routes to School National Partnership, who voiced support of the bikeways planning and call for project program in order to make bikeways and pedestrian ways more accessible to the community. Ms. Chow requested that the call for projects include measures for safer bikeways.

Board Member Nelson commented that, if approved by the Board, a planning effort begins with an inventory of bikeways and then cities and communities are engaged in getting input to determine priority routes and feasibility of routes.

A motion was made by Board Member Hack, seconded by Board Member Nguyen, and declared passed by those present, to:

- A. Approve a multi-year funding plan concept including up to \$700,000 for the Orange County Bikeway Planning Program to be expanded to Orange County Supervisorial Districts One, Two, Three, and Five. Direct staff to work with the Orange County Transportation Authority on local jurisdiction outreach and participation.
- B. Direct the Executive Director to work with the Executive Management Committee and the Technical Advisory Committee to define a potential Call for Projects for countywide planning studies in line with the criteria required by the federal grants to the Orange County Council of Governments has secured. Return to the Board in June for needed approvals.



9. Proposed 2012-2013 Orange County Council of Governments Dues Increase

Dave Simpson, Executive Director, reported that an increase in dues as a funding source would enable OCCOG to be self-sustainable. The proposal was presented to the City Managers' Association earlier this year and was supported by the 30 cities present at that meeting. Staff worked with the special districts on proposed increases.

Discussion ensued among the Members and staff regarding the proposed increases and in-kind contributions from the Cities of Anaheim, Irvine, and Mission Viejo.

A motion was made by Board Member Glaab, seconded by Board Member Ring, and declared passed by those present, to:

- A. Adopt resolution No. 2012-01 supporting a dues increase for Member Agencies for Fiscal Year 2012-2013 that was supported by the Orange County City Managers Association.
- B. Direct the Executive Director to continue to work with the Executive Management Committee, the Orange County Transportation Authority management, and the Orange County City Managers Association on Fiscal Year 2013-2014 dues, operational efficiencies and future administration of OCCOG post June 2013.

Board Members Hack, Harper, Nelson, Nguyen, and Waldman voted in opposition to this item.

10. Update on Regional Housing Needs Assessment

Board Member Kang provided an update on the Regional Housing Needs Assessment (RHNA) and reported that the RHNA Appeals Board met on April 19, 2012 to review the revision requests for the draft RHNA Allocation. Revision requests were submitted by 14 jurisdictions and the Board approved requests to the City of La Puente and Ventura County.

11. Report from the Orange County Council of Governments Technical Advisory Committee Chair

Marika Modugno, Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) Chair, reported that the Committee had a robust discussion at the last meeting regarding the Sustainable Communities Strategy process and how that can be improved and streamlined in the future.

12. Chairman's Report

A report was not offered from the Chairman.



13. Executive Director's Report

Dave Simpson, Executive Director, reported that the next Executive Management Committee meeting will focus on the future of OCCOG.

Public comments were received under Item 8.

15. Board Members' Reports

Board Member Anthony commented that the development of a Sustainable Communities Strategy "lessons learned" document is a good idea.

Board Member Nelson suggested that staff take a look at how things done by OCCOG can be accomplished by other agencies in assessing the future of OCCOG.

Board Member Anthony commented that it should be defined what OCCOG is charged to do; there is a different purpose today than when OCCOG was first formed.

Subject: Approval of the Orange County Council of Governments Fiscal Year 2012-2013 Budget

Discussion: Orange County Council of Governments (OCCOG) proposed Fiscal Year 2012-2013 budget is provided for board discussion and consideration. Justifications for all line items are listed on the proposed budget itself (Attachment A). Per OCCOG bylaws, the Board is required to adopt a resolution of support as part of the approval of annual budgets (Attachment B).

New to this year's proposed budget is a membership dues increase (Attachment C) which was adopted at the May 24, 2012 OCCOG Board meeting. The OCCOG Executive Management Committee has requested that these funds be used to procure a new Executive Director for OCCOG by Fall 2012 so that a transition between the Orange County Transportation Authority (OCTA) and a new administrator of OCCOG can be seamless. OCCOG's current agreement with OCTA expires June 30, 2013.

Pending board approval, OCCOG staff would prepare and release a request for proposals to hire a full-time Executive Director. OCTA would continue to provide administrative services equivalent to the agreement with OCCOG (up to \$141,000 annually, per agreement) for hours spent on support of OCCOG. This would include hours of the OCCOG clerk, treasurer and others who may do work on behalf of OCCOG. OCTA staff support costs for OCCOG for Fiscal Year 2011-2012 (through June 18, 2012) was \$159,976 (Attachment D).

The administrative costs for OCCOG Fiscal Year 2012-2013 would be used to implement the draft OCCOG Work Plan (Attachment E). Specifically, page 5 of the Work Plan outlines proposed tasks. It is recognized that much remains to be discussed about OCCOG's future role in Orange County and the region, including the question of Metropolitan Planning Organization designation.


(3) FY 2012/13 increase in legal fees is needed to assure OCCOG has sufficient legal services. It is anticipated that legal services will be required on discussions of the future of OCCOG, implementation of tasks and agreements necessary for the transition of staffing services, and a complete bylaws update which are new tasks.

(4) These funds cover mileage, parking, and train reimbursements as well as conference and training attendance (fees and travel) such as CALCOG, SCAG General Assembly and other regional meetings held by others,

(5) CALCOG annual dues cost split with OCTA. Due to the fact that OCCOG does not have the resources to provide for legislative advocacy and depends largely on OCTA governemnt relations staff, the Executive Director (current and future) benefit from having such a resource to call upon. CALCOG has been invaluable to the Executive Director for the latest information on state and feeral legislation as well as regulation/rulemaking matters. CALCOG has strong relations with various state offices inculding the Brown Administation, Office of Planning and Research, ARB, and HCD.


(6) FY 2012/13 Increase covers parking validations not previously budgeted and covered by OCTA. These costs are estimated at approxiamately \$325/month (x 12 =\$3,900). Other miscellaneous funds are to cover modest costs of website upgrade, modest public relations/graphic, and minor unforseen costs.

Draft Orange County Council of Governments 2012 – 2013 Work Plan

Background

The Orange County Council of Governments (OCCOG) is a joint powers agency comprised of a voluntary association of member local governments and agencies in Orange County. Originally established by 30 founding member agencies in April 1996 but with roots going back as for as the 1970s under various names, member agencies recognized the public interest, convenience, and necessity in creating a separate legal entity. Known as the OCCOG, this organization was to establish a unified Orange County position in performing its charge as an official subregion of the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG), the federally designated Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO). Beginning in 1998, OCCOG was administered by the Orange County Division, League of California Cities (OC League of Cities).

What is a COG?

COGs are voluntary associations that represent member local governments, mainly cities and counties, that seek to provide cooperative planning, coordination, and technical assistance on issues of mutual concern that cross jurisdictional lines. In this sense, COGs serve to develop consensus on many issues that need to be addressed in a subregional or regional context. If properly structured, COG duties complement and do not duplicate jurisdictional activities, and serve to unify jurisdictions and agencies on matters of mutual concern, but independent of the responsibilities traditionally exercised by the individual members within their own communities.

Jurisdictions typically agree to form COGs following discussion and negotiation on common goals and objectives, which are usually consummated by execution of a Joint Powers Agreement (JPA). In most cases, adoption of a JPA is specifically authorized by state law. In the case of California, JPA authority is granted under Section 6500 et. seq. of the Government Code.

Statutory and Fiscal Incentives:

A major factor in understanding the rationale behind COGs pertains to the legal and fiscal context in which they developed. Councils of Government came into prominence during the 1960's after a series of Congressional mandates promoted area wide planning and coordination. This began first in the transportation area, but was soon followed by a regional approach to such issues as air and water quality, waste management, housing and community development and growth forecasts.

These mandates were typically mirrored by supporting state statutes, and carried with them substantial funding support. COGs were supported by federal and state grant funds designed to target specific goals, but frequently also leaving COGs with some discretion on how such money might best be allocated. Today most COGs, particularly in larger urban or metropolitan areas, are still largely dependent on funding from state and federal sources.

An example of this is the considerable amount of money that was made available for transportation and air quality planning under the Intermodal and Surface Transportation Efficiency Act of 1991 (ISTEA) and the subsequent Transportation Efficiency Act for the 21st Century (TEA-21), which accounts for a majority of planning funds utilized by COGs.



COG Functions:

COG responsibilities are wide-ranging, but in all cases are determined by its member jurisdictions and agencies. Activities common to many COGs include regional review of environmentally significant projects per CEQA; air quality planning; area wide clearinghouse for review of Federal financial assistance; regional housing needs assessment; hazardous and solid waste management; demographic projections; growth management analysis and development of subregional strategies; review of local general plan amendments; area wide water quality planning; transportation planning, modeling and programming; and general planning support and technical assistance as directed by member agencies.

OCCOG History

In October 2006, administrative support services of the OCCOG were transferred to the City of Mission Viejo on an interim and volunteer basis. The City of Mission Viejo provided personnel to serve as executive director, treasurer, auditor/controller, and clerk of the board at no cost to the OCCOG. Technical support was provided by a City of Mission Viejo consultant and staff from various member cities. The legal firm of Aleshire & Wynder, LLP provided pro bono legal services for the OCCOG since October 2001 and in 2009, OCCOG entered into a contractual relationship with this firm for full legal counsel representation.

In 2009, the Orange County Transportation Authority (OCTA) entered into a cooperative agreement for administrative services with OCCOG. This agreement provides financial oversight and day to day administration required to ensure that OCCOG meets all regulatory and statutory requirements to serve as the subregional planning agency for SCAG. The administrative services agreement goes through June 2013. In conjunction with the administrative agreement, the OCTA and OCCOG boards adopted a cooperative agreement for SB 375 planning requirements and have jointly agreed to take subregional delegation to develop a Sustainable Communities Strategy (SCS) for Orange County in accordance with the provisions authorized by SB 375. Similarly, OCCOG, OCTA and SCAG entered into a Memorandum of Understanding which further outlines the roles and responsibilities of each agency as the Orange County SCS was developed.

Currently, 39 local jurisdictions and agencies and seven ex-officio make up the member agencies of OCCOG. Member agencies include 33 cities, the County of Orange, the Transportation Corridor Agencies, the Orange County Transportation Authority (OCTA), and Orange County special districts.

The purpose of OCCOG is to:

- 1) Serve as the SCAG subregional organization that represents Orange County on mandated and non-mandated SCAG regional planning activities;
- 2) Develop and adopt an Orange County Projections (OCP) that serves as Orange County's official growth forecast for local and regional planning; and



3) Serve as a vehicle for cooperative planning for activities and issues of interest to the OCCOG member agencies.

Key OCCOG responsibilities include:

- Protecting Orange County interests in SCAG's development of the Regional Housing Needs Assessment (RHNA) allocation to local jurisdictions in the six-county SCAG region;
- Protecting the local, bottoms-up development of the OCP, which represents Orange County's official growth forecast for local, countywide and regional planning;
- Adopting a growth forecast, which is now required by statute to be used for RHNA allocations and for regional transportation planning; and,
- Providing input and recommendations on new requirements relating to SB 375 (Chapter 728, Statutes of 2008) and its SCS that seeks to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by shifting future and higher-intensity growth near transit stations and facilities.

The tasks outlined above are primarily conducted by OCCOG's Board of Directors (Board), OCCOG Technical Advisory Committee, and through representation of OCCOG Board Members on SCAG's governing board and policy level committees. OCCOG also has in place an executive director and additional professional level staff that support the administration of OCCOG. In October 2010, the OCTA augmented its support of OCCOG by providing a full time Executive Director at no additional cost to OCCOG.

OCCOG was previously administered by the Orange County Division - League of California Cities (OC League) through in-kind staff support. At that time, OCCOG's technical and administrative services were funded indirectly through League of Cities dues and through state and federal grant funding received from SCAG and other agencies. In 2006, Caltrans conducted a pre-award evaluation of OCCOG in response to proposed federal funding to be awarded. The Caltrans pre-award evaluation and findings determined certain deficiencies in OCCOG's financial management system and concluded that OCCOG was to be designated a high-risk agency and would not be eligible to receive future federal and state funding until corrective processes and procedures in financial management and administration were implemented.

OCCOG and OCTA staff have worked with Caltrans, SCAG and the appropriate federal agencies to access an OCCOG federal grant in the amount to fund the SB 375 planning for fiscal years 2009-2010 and 2010-2011. While a "high risk" designation has been removed from OCCOG, less than \$525,000 has been used to date on the OC SCS plan development and submission. The balance of the funds have been programmed by the OCCOG Board earlier this year. These funds will be used for Orange County Bike Planning, a future Call For Projects in a yet to be defined scope of work (must be for countywide planning that reduces congestion), and the balance for a future OC SCS effort.



Looking Back

For those that have attended OCCOG Board meetings over the last 3 years, it is very apparent the organization was extremely focused on implementing SB 375 and, specifically, on developing the Orange County SCS (OC SCS) and assuring it was incorporated in SCAG's 2012-2035 RTP/SCS. These tasks are complete.

The early months of 2012 saw the OCCOG TAC and Board very involved with the review of the RTP/SCS PEIR. Specifically, the inclusion of hundreds of mitigation measures that were seen by local jurisdiction as proscriptive and not in touch with SCAG's efforts to honor local control. In a very compressed timeframe OCCOG was able to work with regional partners to work with SCAG to remove all these measures from the PEIR itself and make them an appendix to the RTP/SCS, serving as a "tool box" of ideas for local jurisdictions and others to consider. This was a major accomplishment.

The current RHNA cycle has been one of the smoothest for Orange County. While this is certainly a positive outcome (to date), the behind the scenes work that went into Orange County's effort, those of CDR and the OCCOG TAC, was in large part the reason why RHNA is less "eventful" than in previous cycles. To be clear, OCCOG and the OCCOG TAC have done its job for member agencies.



Major focus areas of Fiscal Year 2012-13

- 1. Monitor SCAG's implementation of the 2102-2013 RTP/SCS.
- 2. Focused efforts on areas of concern, specifically potential new SCAG committees requested by "Move LA" coalition and others.
- 3. Continue participation in current RHNA cycle assuring all OC jurisdictions are represented and data is used as submitted.
- 4. Prepare an RFP and procure OCCOG Executive Director to be on board in Fall 2012 (pending Board approval).
- 5. Work with OCTA Planning Staff and local jurisdictions to implement boardapproved funding of OC Bike Planning efforts.
- 6. Develop Call for Projects for federal funds supporting Countywide Planning Studies that Reduce Orange County.
- 7. Discuss and explore MPO designation for Orange County per board direction
- 8. Determine Orange County SCS delegation for next RTP/SCS cycle.
- 9. Monitor all SCAG Regional Council and Committee meeting agendas and participate in policy discussions at staff, executive and elected level.
- 10. Define future role of OCCOG.
- 11. Work with OCTA on the transition of OCCOG administrative services for June 2013 and beyond.
- 12. Monitor all AQMD policies and regulations affecting OCCOG member agencies, especially the upcoming AQMP over Summer 2012.
- 13. Support the Center for Demographic Research per agreement, participate with the CDR Management Oversight Committee and related subcommittees.
- 14. Serve as conduit for information to and from SCAG and OCCOG member agencies.
- 15. Monitor state and federal legislation, primarily through CALCOG as well as OCTA Government Relations staff.
- 16. Actively participate in Cap and Trade discussions at the state and federal level.
- 17. Coordinate with OCTA on the next Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP), ensuring full compliance with the SCS and SB 375 requirements.
- 18. Continue efforts along with OCTA to assure federal funds are used as defined by state and federal agencies, including supporting reporting efforts stemming from Caltrans pre-award audit findings and OCCOG's commitments on same.
- 19. As appropriate, explore and pursue state and federal grant opportunities that
- 20. Pursue possibility of holding an OCCOG General Assembly meeting in 2013 in conjunction with the Association of California Cities Orange County.
- 21. Consider the establishment of an OCCOG bylaws subcommittee to review needed updates to reflect needs of OCCOG and member agencies.
- 22. Participate in and attend monthly OCCOG TAC, subregional Coordinator and Planning and Programming TAC monthly meetings.
- 23. Continue improvements needed to OCCOG website

Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) Sustainable Communities Strategy (SCS) ARB Acceptance of GHG Quantification Determination

WHEREAS, the Sustainable Communities and Climate Protection Act of 2008 ((Chap. 728, Stats. 2008) Senate Bill 375, or SB 375, as amended) requires each California Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO), as part of its Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) planning process, to develop a Sustainable Communities Strategy (SCS) or an Alternative Planning Strategy (APS) that meets regional greenhouse gas (GHG) emission reduction targets (targets) set by the Air Resources Board (ARB or Board);

WHEREAS, SB 375 also recognizes ARB's target-setting responsibility as a recurring process, requiring ARB to update the targets every eight years and permitting target updates every four years;

WHEREAS, on September 23, 2010, the Board set 2020 and 2035 GHG targets for the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) region of 8 percent per capita reduction and 13 percent per capita reduction, respectively;

WHEREAS, on December 20, 2011, SCAG published a draft 2012-2035 RTP containing a draft SCS that stated it would meet or exceed the region's GHG targets with an 8 percent per capita reduction by 2020 and a 16 percent per capita reduction by 2035:

WHEREAS, ARB staff performed a technical evaluation of the draft SCS based on ARB's technical methodology for evaluating an SCS (published in July 2011);

WHEREAS, ARB staff's evaluation showed that SCAG used technical methodologies that would accurately quantify GHG reductions from the draft SCS;

WHEREAS, ARB staff evaluated key performance indicators that support SCAG's determination that the draft SCS would meet or exceed the region's GHG targets;

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WHEREAS, ARB staff's evaluation showed that SCAG's draft SCS, if implemented, would meet the GHG targets that the Board established for the region for 2020 and 2035;

WHEREAS, ARB staff presented an informational item on SCAG's draft SCS to the Board at its March 22, 2012 public meeting;

WHEREAS, during the public discussion of this item at its March meeting, the Board identified environmental justice as an important consideration in the regional planning process;

WHEREAS, SCAG's draft 2012-2035 RTP/SCS included a detailed analysis of potential environmental justice impacts and a recommendation to monitor the potential effects of plan implementation, including gentrification;

WHEREAS, the Board acknowledged the need for additional metrics to assess the social equity impacts of RTPs/SCSs, and directed ARB staff to pursue development of improved modeling tools and other technical tools that can assist MPOs and local governments to strengthen their analysis of social equity impacts;

WHEREAS, in response to comments from the public, stakeholders, and the Regional Council, SCAG staff made minor modifications to the draft SCS which resulted in additional GHG reductions projected by 2020 (these proposed changes had been presented to the SCAG Regional Council at a public meeting on March 21, 2012);

WHEREAS, the SCAG Regional Council adopted the final 2012-2035 RTP/SCS as revised at its public meeting on April 4, 2012;

WHEREAS, SCAG submitted the adopted 2012-2035 RTP/SCS to ARB on April 11, 2012, with its GHG quantification determination of a nine percent per capita reduction by 2020 and a 16 percent per capita reduction by 2035, as required by California Government Code section 65080(b)(2)(J)(ii);

WHEREAS, ARB staff reviewed both the draft SCS and subsequent modifications contained in the adopted the 2012-2035 RTP/SCS;

WHEREAS, the adopted 2012-2035 RTP/SCS further supports the ability of the SCS to meet the regional GHG targets because the reductions in per capita GHG emissions in 2020 would be slightly greater than demonstrated by the draft SCS, and the reduction in

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per capita GHG emissions in 2035 would be the same as demonstrated by the draft SCS;

WHEREAS, ARB staff's technical review of SCAG's GHG reduction quantification is contained in Attachment A, "Technical Evaluation of Greenhouse Gas Emission Reduction Quantification for SCAG's SCS," dated May 1, 2012;

WHEREAS, section 65080(b)(2)(J)(ii) of the California Government Code calls for the ARB to accept or reject the MPO's determination that the strategy submitted would, if implemented, achieve the greenhouse gas emission reduction targets established by the Board;

WHEREAS, the California Health and Safety Code sections 39515 and 39516 delegate to the Board's Executive Officer the authority to act on behalf of the Board in this manner;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that pursuant to section 65080(b)(2)(J)(ii) of the California Government Code, the Executive Officer hereby accepts SCAG's quantification of GHG emission reductions from the SCS adopted by the SCAG Regional Council on April 4, 2012, and the MPO's determination that the SCS would, if implemented, achieve the 2020 and 2035 GHG emission reduction targets established by ARB.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS ORDERED that ARB staff is directed to forward this executive order to the SCAG Regional Council and Executive Director.

- 1. More review time (both OC SCS and RTP/SCS).
- 2. OC SCS consultant on board earlier.
- 3. Outreach for OC SCS more could be done, maybe add more scope here.
- 4. Outreach for RTP/SCS in OC....more could be done here, allow COG more control over workshops/outreach in general.
- 5. Public meeting review of documents/materials (both but comment mostly towards RTP/SCS.
- 6. More opportunity for TAC to weigh in on draft materials (both).
- 7. Define post subregional adoption more clearly.

OCCOG TAC: Lessons learned on RTP/SCS June 2012

The OCCOG Technical Advisory Committee was an active participant in the collection of data utilized in the Orange County Sustainable Communities Strategy (OCSCS), the development and review of the OC SCS, and the development and review of the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) 2012 Regional Transportation Plan/Sustainable Communities Strategy (2012 RTP/SCS) and Program Environmental Impact Report (PEIR). Following adoption of the 2012 RTP/SCS and PEIR, the OCCOG TAC reviewed and discussed the OC SCS and 2012 RTP/SCS and PEIR processes that began in late 2008. The focus of the discussion was to identify areas that could be improved to ensure the 2016 RTP/SCS process is more efficient and inclusive.

One of the most significant issues identified by the OCCOG TAC is the need for a schedule that allows adequate time to develop all aspects of the RTP/SCS, while providing adequate time for SCAG members, jurisdictional staff, interested agencies, and members of the public to thoroughly review the RPT/SCS and associated PEIR. The schedule should also include ample review time prior to the required adoption date of the RTP/SCS that would allow for additional tasks, such as a recirculation of the document in the event significant changes are made to the draft. Using the benchmark dates from the 2012 RTP/SCS, the OCCOG TAC prepared a sample, modified timeline for the 2016 RTP/SCS that would incorporate all of these elements into the process. According to the draft timeline, subregions would need to make a determination on whether or not to accept subregional delegation by early 2013 in order to begin preparations for the development of their subregional SCS which would have an approximate completion date of late 2014. To meet this schedule, initial data collection for the next iteration of the Orange County Projections, a subregional SCS, and the SCAG RTP/SCS and PEIR would begin in the second half of 2012.

The detailed list of "lessons learned" and the draft 2016 RTP/SCS timeline are included as attachments for the Board's reference and use. The lessons learned document includes two sections: 1) Orange County's SCS process and 2) SCAG's regional RTP/SCS process. OCCOG TAC Chair Marika Modugno, City of Irvine, will highlight some of the other significant issues identified by the OCCOG TAC.

Lessons learned for Orange County's Subregional SCS:

- Subregional outreach
 - Have meetings to discuss delegation
 - Coordinate closely with SCAG
 - Subregionally focused meetings should not begin until delegation is decided
- If OC accepts delegation:
 - TAC review should be incorporated into draft review and approval timelines, this would lengthen the timeline.
 - TAC should assist by reviewing chapters & themes of document prior to release for review.
 - Allow more time to review drafts prior to Board & TAC meetings.
 - Coordinate timeline with LRTP & OCP
- Subregional SCS Consultant
 - RFP should be more specific on responsibilities of different parties. For example, consultants should lead stakeholder groups, collect information, & report to TAC & Board; no promises or agreements by consultants.
 - Include timeline of deadlines, milestones, and deliverables in scope, e.g. length of circulation period for comments on final document

OCCOG TAC: Lessons learned on RTP/SCS June 2012

- Information from outreach should be fed to Board & TAC which would then decide what gets incorporated into document.
- Board & TAC should decide what comments/topics from comment period be added into document.
- Clarify work product for post subregional adoption through RTP adoption. List any benefits. It is unclear how OC benefited by work after OCSCS was adopted.

Lessons learned to be presented to SCAG:

- Data
 - Update all versions of data within agency or just use single source of data.
 - Consolidate the data sources & uses. Too often data was submitted by a jurisdiction, and then used by multiple SCAG groups/depts, but errors were not corrected in all versions.
 - Meetings on data:
 - Hold general review & introduction meeting with group like OCCOG TAC and invite all jurisdictions. Disseminate data.
 - Hold individual meetings with jurisdictions after group intro to correct & update data.
 - When data is delivered, explain all possible uses & applications so jurisdictions are informed of how information may or will be used.
 - Have TAZ level data review by jurisdictions
 - Reduce the number of rounds of data review
 - Decide on base year for 2016 RTP. Sooner to know the better. Is much easier for jurisdictions to provide current data than to go back in time & recreate "existing conditions" i.e. in 2010 go back and recreate 2008 data.
 - Coordinate with subregional coordinators, planning directors and other data groups, such as CDR on data review & outreach.
 - If RHNA is involved, explicitly state the time period in which data contained may be used to calculate the RHNA numbers.
 - o If formal approval is desired, have City Manager or designee sign off.
- Public outreach/stakeholder groups
 - Don't have subregionally focused outreach meetings until after delegation is decided. If any outreach meetings held in subregions prior to decision of delegation, focus should only be on regional issues.
 - 2012 round- public outreach started too early. There were too many questions on process unanswered. Participants expressed frustration with little progress and lots of hype.
 - Coordinate outreach meetings with delegated subregions.
 - Use stakeholder meetings to educate the public & stakeholders about the purpose, process, & requirements of RTP (specific timelines, projects, funding, county-level decisions & measures cannot be changed).
- Plans and Programs Technical Advisory Committee (P&P TAC)
 - Clarify purpose of P&P- technical review, not advocacy.
 - Instead of having TAC be group where advocacy is discussed and voiced, utilize a separate stakeholder group where the outcomes are given technical review by the P&P TAC.
 - Begin discussions now on things like mitigation measures, performance measures to have these items finalized before modeling takes place
 - o Materials need to be sent to group earlier with the agenda
 - Shorten presentations

OCCOG TAC: Lessons learned on RTP/SCS June 2012

- Allow more time for questions/discussion
- When data & topics are being presented, explain all possible uses & applications so audience is informed of how information will be used.
- Review draft chapters as developed, provide technical input & review of document
- o Survey questions in workshops should be vetted by SRC and/or TAC
- Policy committee meetings
 - Have longer meetings to accommodate:
 - Longer public comment period
 - Meaningful discussion on topics at hand
 - Don't allow joint meetings to supersede committee purview items. Meet individually to discuss items under purview i.e. EEC- PEIR, CEHD- growth forecast, TC- projects & financing...
 - Start discussion on policy and overall investments earlier.
 - Chart subcommittee reporting structure.
- Subregional SCS
 - Outreach should be coordinated with COGs, especially delegated subregions
 - Coordinate timelines with subregional CTC's long range transportation plans and data collection
 - Subregions should outline the content of their SCS early in the process and memorialize this with SCAG through the MOU process

On April 4, 2012, the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) Regional Council unanimously certified the Program Environmental Impact Report (EIR) and adopted the 2012 Regional Transportation Plan/Sustainable Communities Strategy (RTP/SCS). These documents characterize the mobility future in the Southern California region, including the improvements and investments needed to accommodate that future, and the impacts of the plan. Most notably, for the first time this RTP/SCS includes strategies to link transportation and land use planning to reduce greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions throughout the region. The SCAG RTP/SCS incorporates the OCSCS as the strategies that Orange County agencies have followed and will continue to follow to achieve GHG reductions.

With incorporation of the OCSCS into the regional RTP/SCS and adoption of the regional plan, the LSA Associates, Inc. (LSA) Team role is concluded. LSA, Orange County Business Council (OCBC), and Burke Consulting are appreciative to have been part of the preparation of this landmark document and to have participated in an active and inclusive stakeholder outreach effort. The Team believes that its contribution was meaningful and helpful. With the close of its responsibilities, the team wanted to provide its evaluation of the overall process, its role, and the interaction between the LSA Team and others committed to the successful completion of the OCSCS.

SCHEDULE AND TIMING

As you know, from the outset, the schedule for the development of both the RTP/SCS and the OCSCS was aggressive and fixed. No flexibility was granted in the timing of deliverables at the local, regional, or State level. The increments of time between milestones were brief. This fast, constrained schedule had two effects on the Orange County work effort. First, all parties involved made a considerable commitment to completing the various tasks required to draft and finalize the OCSCS within the allotted timeframe. Second, there was some level of frustration by individuals/groups directing, reviewing, and providing input to the document throughout the process. This frustration related to the amount of time (or lack thereof) for review, comment, committee meetings, and local and regional outreach and coordination.

As an example, the LSA Team contract was signed in August 2010, yet the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between SCAG, Orange County Transportation Authority (OCTA), and OCCOG was not signed until late September 2010. The roles and responsibilities between the participating agencies were not yet confirmed when the work plan and approach was proposed by the consultant team.

The first deliverable was submitted within schedule and within 2 weeks of our initial kickoff meeting. While the LSA Team did prepare a Project Management Plan (PMP) to identify chain of communication, review cycles, and all other management and accounting efforts, little time was available to conduct a thorough vetting of all stakeholders' expectations and manage those expectations against the realities of the mandated schedule. This became most apparent during document review cycles and deadlines set by SCAG and the California Air Resources Board (ARB), as well as setting hearing dates and regional deadlines.

As noted above, significant efforts were made by the LSA Team, stakeholders, and other participants to accommodate the inflexible schedule. These include the work of the Center for Demographic Research (CDR) and its development of the socioeconomic data and mapping. The CDR was a valuable asset and contributor that enhanced the efficiency in creating the required underlying data for the OCSCS. The focus and flexibility of the OCCOG Board of Directors and Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) were instrumental in ensuring that products prepared by the LSA Team reflected the direction of the local agencies.

Also of particular importance was the formation of a TAC subcommittee to review and edit draft documents prepared by the LSA Team. By delegating this function to a small group and coordinating this small group with the larger TAC, the LSA Team was able to balance the short periods given to analyze data, assemble materials, draft documents (including tables and graphics), and prepare reports while addressing the direction and strategies from the agencies. The LSA Team instituted regular Friday conference calls within the team, including the Executive Director. These calls were valuable to provide a regular weekly update on a standard agenda of items. Accountability and action items were reviewed weekly. Given the compressed work schedule, the weekly conference calls provide a frequent and much-appreciated channel to confirm overall project direction and maintain Team focus.

Recommendations for future consideration include:

- 1. Engage in Board-level discussions early on to decide whether to pursue delegation for future preparation of a subregional SCS.
- 2. Execute an MOU months prior to consultant procurement for preparation of a subregional SCS.
- 3. Prior to consultant selection, the Board of Directors and/or Executive Director should define roles for the TAC and other committees, including expectations for collaboration in document drafting, document review responsibilities and schedules, Board responsibilities, and TAC responsibilities.
- 4. Formation of a TAC subcommittee to review and edit draft documents prepared by the consultant.
- 5. Adequate time should be assigned for an initial engagement period with selected consultant team and Board and/or TAC to discuss schedule; clarify roles and reporting responsibilities; and identify milestones, deliverables, and meetings/hearings.
- 6. One initial product to consider is a master schedule that illustrates the entire SCS preparation process with individual milestones and tasks. This schedule would be linked to the regularly scheduled Board, TAC, and other committee meetings and would show where the process is "synched" and where the regular OCCOG and TAC meeting schedules might require modification to provide adequate input and review periods.
- 7. The consultant team should include a summary of the schedule, highlighting upcoming milestones, deliverables, and meetings at the outset of meetings with the Board, TAC, and other

committees. The consultant team should also review achievements and milestones at these meetings to ensure ongoing attainment of work plan objectives.

CONSULTANT TEAM COMPOSITION

It is the LSA Team's belief that the make-up of the Team was crucial to the success of the inaugural OCSCS. In August 2010, very little was known about how to prepare an OCSCS or what it might look like at its completion. In short, this was a new project that had never been tried. Further, it represented an opportunity for building a unique partnership with SCAG. LSA brought to this effort an energetic team with expertise not only in project management, transportation, and report writing, but also with positive, established relationships with key SCAG staff. Through the efforts of OCTA, the OCCOG TAC, CDR, and the LSA Team, this new frontier was successfully navigated.

The experience gained from pioneering the OCSCS, witnessing an alternative method of completing a subregional SCS, and examining completed RTP/SCSs from other regions will help OCCOG decide whether to again accept subregional delegation, as well as the expertise needed from future consultant teams.

PUBLIC OUTREACH

The LSA Team was also the consultant to assist in public outreach and stakeholder engagement. The LSA Team participated in over 60 meetings through development of the OCSCS and met with representatives from primary, secondary, and university-level educational backgrounds; public health services; housing advocates; active transportation, transit, and environmental groups; the Transportation Corridor Agency; land development and housing advocates; Building Industry Association; Urban Land Institute; public law; and social justice. In many cases, the LSA Team made the presentations and acted as the SCS lead.

The LSA Team also created a unique web-based tool to invite and encourage public investigation and participation. The OCSCS Web Tool provided regular updates to the status of the OCSCS, SCAG meetings and activities, and actions by ARB. It also included links to all affected Orange County agencies and profiled many SCS-related plans and programs undertaken by OC cities and the County. LSA received over 100 hits and inquiries on the Web Tool that were assembled into a Communication Manual for submittal as part of the outreach conducted on behalf of the OCSCS.

A detailed public outreach program was not included as a work task in the OCTA/OCCOG Request for Proposal, nor was it a primary task of the LSA Team, which was available to support a broader effort to be developed outside the work plan. However, the role of public outreach expanded as the OCSCS was in preparation. LSA's adjunct role in public outreach may have appeared at times as lack of forethought in the running of meetings. Stakeholder meetings were at times casual, did not include agendas, and were not developed with a goal and objective in mind.

Recommendations for future consideration include:

1. As part of the Delegation decision, the Board should consider public outreach and stakeholder engagement as a separate yet integral element to be included in the preparation of the OCSCS.

2. The procurement process should include the selection of a Public Outreach specialist, either as part of the overall consultant team or as a stand-alone, to assume the roles necessary to achieve the goals for public engagement in Senate Bill (SB) 375.

Although this memo has focused on recommendations for improvement of potential future OCSCS efforts, we should not lose sight that, by most accounts, the OCSCS was a new and difficult initiative that was delivered on time with few real glitches. It was new territory for each party and stakeholder involved, both within Orange County, at the SCAG region level, and throughout the State of California, and by most measures, the effort and work product not only met the requirements, but in fact exceeded expectations. The OCSCS was into the SCAG 2012 RTP/SCS and reflected not only Orange County's input and the exact criteria set down in the MOU, but also Orange County's ability to come together and collaborate to produce an OCSCS that Orange County can be proud of. The document, process, and most importantly, relationships developed by the development of Orange County's first SCS, hopefully set the tone for future related collaborations.

Scope of Work Summary District 1 & 2 Bikeways Collaborative

The District 1 & 2 Collaborative scope of work is for the development of a bikeways strategy (Strategy) and a set of feasibility studies (Studies) for the Supervisorial Districts 1 & 2 areas. The Strategy will identify regional bikeway corridors that connect to major activity centers including employment areas, transit stations colleges and universities. The regional bikeway corridors will be identified based on consensus-building and facilitation efforts.

Corridors will be scored and ranked and the top performing corridors will be further developed in the Studies. The Studies will help to develop shelf-ready projects for future funding opportunities. They will build from information identified in the Strategy and entail more-detailed analysis of such factors as applicable street standards, adjacent land uses, and neighborhood support. Based on such analysis, the Studies will provide specific recommendations for improvements and enhancements to the corridor.
