### Measure M2 (M2) Environmental Mitigation Program Overview



- M2-approved November 2006
- Innovative Freeway Environmental Mitigation Program
  - Off-sets impacts to animal and plant species for 13 M2 freeway projects
  - Through the purchase of open space lands and habitat restoration
- Approximately 5% of the M2 freeway program revenue







- Streamlined permitting through partnerships with:
  - California Department of Transportation
  - state and federal wildlife agencies
  - state and federal regulatory agencies
- Completed Natural Community Conservation
  Plan/Habitat Conservation Plan (Conservation Plan)
- Environmental Document
- Programmatic Clean Water Act Permits



### Acquisition and Restoration




- Seven Preserves acquired as permanent open space
  - 1,300 acres
- Twelve restoration projects
  - 400 acres
  - Replacing invasive weeds
    with native habitat
  - Removing small dams

#### **Milestones**

Nov 2016: OCTA Board of Directors Approved Conservation Plan and Final Environmental Document

Mar 2017: made \$2.9 million deposit to endowment

Jun 2017: State and Federal Wildlife Agencies issued permits

Jun 2017: OCTA held commemoration event

### **Next Steps**

Implement Measure M2 freeway projects and utilize comprehensive mitigation

Release Aliso Canyon and Hayashi Resource Management Plans (RMPs) and complete remaining RMPs

Continue coordination with Army Corps of Engineers to obtain state and federal regulatory agencies permits

Establish a one-time payment for long-term management of restoration projects for Corps permits
