OCTA Approves SB 1 Program Recommendations for Fiscal Year 2022-23

The OCTA board approved the use of funding from SB 1 State of Good Repair Program (Chapter 5, Statues of 2017) for the following:

- Transit Security and Operations Center
- Heating-ventilation unit replacement at the Santa Ana Bus Base
- Bus engine repower/rebuild contract

The State of Good Repair Program (SGR) is a transit capital program funded by the SB 1 Transportation Improvement Fee, that is funded through vehicle registrations. The specific goal of the program is to rehabilitate and upgrade existing local transit systems, equipment, and facilities.

OCTA expects to receive \$6.5 million in State of Good Repair funding for FY 2022-23. This will partially fund the Transit Security and Operations Center construction, which includes replacing OCTA's control-center facility, known as the Garden Grove Annex, and a heating-ventilation unit replacement at the Santa Ana Bus Base.

Additionally, the board approved the reprograming of \$2.56 million of FY 2019-20 SGR funding, originally approved for purchasing five iShuttle buses to the bus engine repower/rebuild contract.

Overall, it is estimated that the Transportation Improvement Fee will provide \$121 million to transit agencies statewide for FY 2022-23. After the projects are approved, funds will be released to transit agencies on a quarterly basis, beginning in November.
