2. Southern California Association of Governments' Memorandum of Understanding with Orange Council of Governments and Orange County Transportation Authority for Orange County Sustainable Communities Strategy

Kristine Murray, Executive Director, provided an overview of the technical language changes made to the Southern California Association of Governments' (SCAG) Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with Orange County Council of Governments (OCCOG) and the Orange County Transportation Authority (OCTA) for the Orange County Sustainable Communities Strategy (SCS) and the roles and responsibilities between SCAG and Orange County to conduct the SCS. Ms. Murray also reported that this item was presented to the OCCOG/OCTA SCS Joint Working Committee earlier in the day and that the Committee agreed to one change in the language of the MOU as follows on Page 2, line 3:

"Whereas, SCAG is required by SB 375 to include a subregional SCS in the regional SCS, to the extent consistent with state and federal law, <u>including</u> the subregional SCS conducted by OCCOG; and"

A motion was made by Committee Member Brothers, seconded by Committee Member Martinez, and declared passed by those present, to receive the overview and authorize the OCCOG Executive Director to approve the Memorandum of Understanding with the edits indicated by the Orange County Council of Governments/Orange County Transportation Authority Sustainable Communities Strategy Joint Working Committee.

Subject: Orange County Councils of Governments (OCCOG) Financial Report

Summary: OCCOG financial information is provided for Board review.

As of May 31, 2010, OCCOG had a bank balance of \$217,506.85 at Bank of the West. Outstanding checks totaled \$159,938.00, leaving a net

balance of \$57,568.85.

As of June 7, 2010, OCCOG received outstanding dues payments from the City of Tustin and Independent Service Districts of Orange County (ISDOC) for fiscal year 2009-2010. Huntington Beach has processed their outstanding Center for Demographic Research (CDR) dues; however, as of the date this staff report was written, payment has not yet been received. For outstanding OCCOG dues from member agencies, the City of San Juan has an outstanding balance of \$3,237.00 and the City of Villa Park has an outstanding balance of \$962.30. All outstanding dues are expected to be

cured within 30 days.

Addendum to Item 2 Treasurer's Report: Approval of Orange County Council of Governments (OCCOG) 2010-11 Budget

Summary:

Per Orange County Council of Governments (OCCOG) bylaws, the OCCOG Board of Directors (Board) is required to approve a budget annually. As a 40-member joint powers authority, OCCOG serves as an official subregion of the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG). OCCOG provides a coordinated mechanism for Orange County policy recommendations to be issued on SCAG plans and programs and on behalf of its member agencies. OCCOG is funded through membership dues, grants, and in-kind contributions from the Orange County Transportation Authority (OCTA).

Anticipated revenue for fiscal year (FY) 2010-11 is \$658,700 from member dues, Center for Demographic Research (CDR) Fees and federal grant funding. Expenditures of \$658,700 are budgeted for administrative fees and professional services related to projects, including the preparation of the Sustainable Communities Strategy (SCS) as required by SB 375. Please refer to the proposed FY 2010-11 budget (Attachment A) for specific details. As part of the Board's action to adopt the FY 2010-11 OCCOG Budget, the attached resolution (Attachment B) will be signed by the Chairman and certified by the Clerk of the Board.

The OCCOG Board's approval of the attached budget authorizes specified expenditures for FY 2010-11. Any changes to the budget will be brought to the Board for further action. The Executive Director will prepare an annual budget for Board consideration per the OCCOG bylaws that will include any carry forward, unexpended appropriations from the prior fiscal year.

Background:

During FY 2010-11 there are a number of key deliverables for OCCOG. These include but are not limited to:

- Oversight and development of the Orange County Subregional Sustainable Communities Strategy (SCS), which will also support regional efforts to meet green house gas reduction targets set by the California Air Resources Board;
- Representing Orange County interests in the development of a Regional Housing Needs Assessment (RHNA) in the SCAG region;
- Working with CDR to develop a local, bottoms-up Orange County Projections (OCP), which represents Orange County's official growth forecast for local and regional planning;
- Advocating for Orange County interests in broad policy areas such as transportation, housing, air quality, water infrastructure and other regulatory areas in the SCAG region.

The proposed budget that follows is a best estimate on revenues and expenditures projected for FY 2010-11. Based on available records, the OCCOG board has not adopted a formal budget for the past couple of years. However, attached for Board review is the FY 2009 Financial Statements and Auditor Communications (Attachment B). A formal OCCOG budget will be developed annually for Board review and adoption going forward.

Recommendation: Approve Fiscal Year 2010-11 OCCOG Budget.

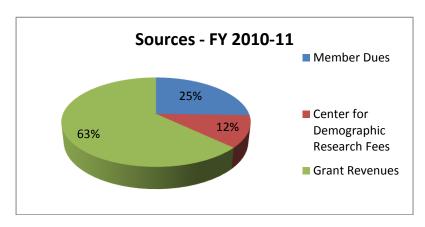

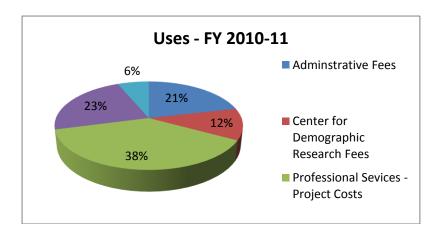

Notes to the Basic Financial Statements

Year ended June 30, 2009

(1) Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Organization

The Orange County Council of Governments (OCCOG) was created in August 1996 by a Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement (Agreement) between public agency parties located in Orange County, California (Members). This Agreement shall continue in existence until the Agreement is terminated. This Agreement may not be terminated except by an affirmative vote of a majority of total voting membership of the Governing Board.

The OCCOG was formed to enable the Members to voluntarily engage in regional and cooperative planning and coordination of government services and responsibilities to assist the Members in the conduct of their affairs. The goal and intent of the OCCOG is one of voluntary cooperation among cities for the collective benefit of cities in Orange County.

The books and records for the OCCOG for the year ended June 30, 2009 are maintained by the City of Mission Viejo, Finance Department at 200 Civic Center, Mission Viejo, California 92691.

(b) Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting, and Financial Statement Presentation

The basic financial statements of the OCCOG are composed of the following:

- Government-wide financial statements
- · Fund financial statements
- Notes to the basic financial statements

Government-wide Financial Statements

Government-wide financial statements are presented using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Under the economic resources measurement focus, all (both current and long-term) economic resources and obligations of the reporting government are reported in the government-wide financial statements. Basis of accounting refers to when revenues and expenditures are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements. Under the accrual basis of accounting, revenues, expenses, gains, losses, assets, and liabilities resulting from exchange and exchange-like transactions are recognized when the exchange takes place. Revenues, expenses, gains, losses, assets, and liabilities resulting from nonexchange transaction are recognized in accordance with the requirements of GASB Statement No. 33.

Notes to the Basic Financial Statements

(Continued)

(1) Summary of Significant Accounting Policies, (Continued)

(b) Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting, and Financial Statement Presentation, (Continued)

Fund Financial Statements

Government fund financial statements are reported using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified-accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized as soon as they are both measurable and available. Revenues are considered to be available when they are collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay liabilities of the current period.

For this purpose, the government considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 60 days of the end of the current fiscal period. Expenditures generally are recorded when a liability is incurred, as under accrual accounting.

The OCCOG reports the following as a major governmental fund:

The <u>General Fund</u> is used to account for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

(c) Use of Estimates

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and may include amounts based on estimates and assumptions by management. Actual results could differ from those amounts.

(2) Cash

Cash consists of bank demand deposit accounts.

The California Government Code requires California banks and savings and loan associations to secure a government's deposits by pledging government securities with a value of 110% of a government's deposits. California law also allows financial institutions to secure government deposits by pledging first trust deed mortgage notes having a value of 150% of a government's total deposits. The collateral for deposits in federal and state chartered banks is held in safekeeping by an authorized Agent of Depository recognized by the State of California Department of Banking. These securities are physically held in an undivided pool for all California public agency depositors. As of June 30, 2009, the OCCOG held \$43,762 in uncollateralized deposits and did not have any amounts in excess of Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation limits.

However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the OCCOG's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the OCCOG's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the OCCOG's internal control over financial reporting.

A control deficiency exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect misstatements on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a control deficiency, or combination of control deficiencies, that adversely affects the OCCOG's ability to initiate, authorize, record, process, or report financial data reliably in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles such that there is more than a remote likelihood that a misstatement of the OCCOG's financial statements that is more than inconsequential will not be prevented or detected by the OCCOG's internal control.

Approval of payment for Administrative Services per Cooperative Agreement with Orange County Transportation Authority

Summary:

As part of the Administrative Agreement (Attachment A) between the Orange County Council of Governments (OCCOG) and the Orange County Transportation Authority (OCTA), OCCOG agreed to pay the sum of \$141,000.00 to OCTA annually for administrative services.

While the agreement stipulates that payments can be made quarterly, member agency Joint Powers Agreements (JPA) and dues needed to be processed to provide sufficient funds. With nearly all member agencies paid, payment is now requested covering FY 2009-2010.

The amount of revenue generated by OCCOG member agency dues annually is 167,800. Subtracting the OCCOG payment of \$141,000, the remaining amount of \$26,800.00 in dues was anticipated to cover the cost of legal fees and to conduct an annual financial audit. When the administrative agreement was developed, OCTA staff worked closely with OCCOG staff to determine the time commitment involved in the various administrative functions of the OCCOG. OCTA staff provided an estimate of costs associated with the administrative services to be provided prior to approval of the administrative agreement (Attachment B). The estimated cost for the executive director, clerk of the board, treasurer, auditor/controller, and support staff were based on the salaries and benefits of existing OCTA staff that would perform the various administrative functions.

Since assuming administrative responsibility of OCCOG, OCTA has exceeded the original estimate of in-kind support. The in-kind contribution by OCTA can be traced directly to some very time-consuming tasks. These tasks include but are not limited to: Getting the Administrative and Sustainable Communities Strategy (SCS) cooperative agreements approved; developing and securing approvals for the memorandum of understanding (MOU) between Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG), OCCOG and OCTA to develop an Orange County Subregional SCS; developing the Request for Proposals (RFP) for consultant services for the Orange County SCS; and, completing the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) audit to remove OCCOG from the high-risk grant recipient list so that the OCCOG may once again be eligible to receive local, state and federal funding.

Recommendation: Approve payment to Orange County Transportation Authority.

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COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT NO. C-9-0496

BETWEEN

ORANGE COUNTY TRANSPORTATION AUTHORITY

AND

ORANGE COUNTY COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENTS

FOR

ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

RECITALS:

WHEREAS, OCCOG has requested AUTHORITY to provide staff to administer the functions and activities of OCCOG; and

WHEREAS, AUTHORITY is willing to accept responsibility for the administration of OCCOG functions and activities as provided in this Agreement.

WHEREAS, AUTHORITY's Board of Directors approved this Agreement on July 13, 2009.

NOW THEREFORE, it is mutually understood and agreed by AUTHORITY and OCCOG as follows:

ARTICLE 1. RESPONSIBILITIES OF OCCOG

- A. Make available to AUTHORITY all records in the possession of OCCOG and its consultants as may regard any matter within the jurisdiction of OCCOG and as may be required for AUTHORITY to perform its duties under this Agreement.
 - B. Provide legal counsel to advise and represent OCCOG.
 - C. Appoint an OCCOG representative to the Center for Demographic Research ("CDR").

 D. Pursue the adoption by OCCOG member agencies of annual membership dues in the amount approved by the OCCOG Board to pay for the administrative services provided by AUTHORITY as well as the activities and programs of OCCOG.

E. Upon OCCOG member agencies' approval of an amended Joint Powers Agreement requiring the member agencies to pay dues to the OCCOG in amounts as approved by the OCCOG Board, pay AUTHORITY the sum of \$141,000 per year for the services provided by AUTHORITY. Twenty-five percent (25%) of this sum shall be paid to AUTHORITY on the first day of each quarter (first day of July, October, January and April), commencing July 1, 2009.

ARTICLE 2. RESPONSIBILITIES OF AUTHORITY

A. Provide administrative services to OCCOG consistent with and subject to the OCCOG Joint Powers Agreement, Bylaws and other formally adopted policies, contracts and applicable regulations, with the understanding that the AUTHORITY'S policies and procedures for procurements and grant management shall govern all services provided by AUTHORITY pursuant to this Agreement.

- B. Assume responsibility for the administration of OCCOG, including providing meeting sites; administration of the OCCOG Board of Directors and the OCCOG Technical Advisory Committee; conduct elections of the Southern California Association of Governments ("SCAG") Regional Council/OCCOG Board of Directors; preparation of agendas, staff reports and minutes; distribution and posting of meeting notices and meeting materials; conduct of OCCOG financial requirements pursuant to the OCCOG Bylaws and Caltrans pre-award audit determinations; invoicing and collection of payments from Orange County cities for OCCOG's sponsorship of the CDR; invoicing and collection of payments from member agencies for OCCOG dues; and maintenance and storage of records.
- C. Provide staff and/or contract for consultant support for OCCOG to carry out its responsibilities, including the designation of:

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- OCCOG Executive Director, subject to the approval of OCCOG Board of Directors;
- (2) Clerk of the OCCOG Board;
- (3) OCCOG Treasurer;
- (4) OCCOG Auditor/Controller.
- D. Responsibilities of the OCCOG Executive Director (or his/her designee) shall be as specified in the OCCOG Bylaws, and shall also include the following:
 - (1) OCCOG Subregional Coordinator to the SCAG; and
 - (2) OCCOG representative to the SCAG Plans and Programs Technical Advisory Committee.

ARTICLE 3. JOINT RESPONSIBILITIES OF OCCOG AND AUTHORITY

- A. Develop and adopt a work plan for Fiscal Year 2009-10 and 2010-11 to comply with the responsibilities of each entity. The work plan shall identify the tasks, staffing, costs, schedules, necessary services and deliverables, and shall assign financial and policy responsibilities for each entity.
- B. Each entity to maintain a sponsor membership with the CDR and use the CDR for demographic forecasts.
- C. Develop and approve concurrent with this Administrative Services Agreement a separate Agreement between the entities specifying their respective roles and responsibilities in complying with the provisions of SB 375 (Chapter 728, 2008 laws).
- D. AUTHORITY and/or OCCOG may elect to participate in additional regional monitoring and planning activities outside of those covered by this Agreement. In that case, each entity may independently support those activities with monetary and resources other than those specified in this Agreement.

ARTICLE 4. PRE-EXISTING CIRCUMSTANCES

OCCOG hereby discloses, in general terms, that OCCOG is currently the subject of regular and/or special audits by one or more sources of funds. AUTHORITY will assist OCCOG in its efforts to complete the audits and develop a beneficial remedial program to respond to any required programmatic modifications. The OCCOG hereby represents and acknowledges that these pre-existing conditions are not directly or indirectly, related to any action or failure to act of AUTHORITY'S and that, if AUTHORITY cannot achieve a remedy suitable to all interested parties, AUTHORITY will not be deemed to have any fault or responsibility for such conclusion.

ARTICLE 5. INDEMNIFICATION

- A. OCCOG shall defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the AUTHORITY, its officers, directors, agents, and employees, from all liability, claims, losses and demands, including defense costs and reasonable attorneys' fees, whether resulting from court action or otherwise, arising out of the acts or omissions of OCCOG, its officers, directors, agents, or employees, in the performance of this Agreement.
- B. AUTHORITY shall defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the OCCOG, its officers, directors, agents, and employees, from all liability, claims, losses and demands, including defense costs and reasonable attorneys' fees, whether resulting from court action or otherwise, arising out of the acts or omissions of AUTHORITY, its officers, directors, agents, or employees, in the performance of this Agreement.

ARTICLE 6. ASSIGNMENT

AUTHORITY shall not assign the performance of this Agreement, nor any part thereof, nor any monies due hereunder, without prior written consent of OCCOG.

ARTICLE 7. TERM OF AGREEMENT

This Agreement shall commence upon execution by both parties and approval by both parties of a separate agreement regarding SB 375 planning requirements, and shall continue in full force and effect through June 30, 2013, unless terminated earlier by any party. The term may be

 extended by mutual consent; for a period of time agreed upon in writing between the parties. AUTHORITY or OCCOG may terminate this Agreement, without cause, by delivering written notice of termination to the other party not less than one hundred twenty (120) calendar days before the date of termination. Upon the date of termination each party shall, at no cost to the other party, make available all equipment, materials, documents or records in their possession to the party that requests the same.

ARTICLE 8. ENTIRE AGREEMENT

This Agreement contains the entire understanding between the parties relating to the obligations of the parties described in this Agreement. All prior or contemporaneous agreements, understandings, representations and statements, oral or written, are merged into this Agreement and shall be of no further force or effect. Each party is entering into this Agreement based solely upon the representations set forth herein and upon each party's own independent investigation of any and all facts such party deems material.

ARTICLE 9. AUTHORITY TO EXECUTE THIS AGREEMENT

The person or persons executing this Agreement warrant and represent that he or she has the authority to execute this Agreement on behalf of their principal and has the authority to bind such party to the performance of its obligations hereunder.

Subject: Executive Director's Report

Summary: The Executive Director's report provides the Orange County Council of

Governments (OCCOG) Board of Directors an update on staff activities pertaining to final approval of the memorandum of understanding (MOU) with the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) to conduct an Orange County Subregional Sustainable Communities Strategy (SCS), the release of a request for proposals (RFP) for a SCS consultant to develop and manage the planning requirements to conduct the Orange County Subregional SCS, and an update on SB 375 clean-up legislation and relevant California Transportation Commission (CTC) Regional

Transportation Plan (RTP) guidelines pertaining to SB 375.

Background: MOU with SCAG and OCCOG/Orange County Transportation Authority (OCTA) to Conduct Subregional SCS

The enactment of SB 375 (Chapter 728, Statutes of 2008) provided for subregional councils of governments in the SCAG region to work with the respective county transportation commissions to develop transportation and land use strategies to meet greenhouse gas reduction targets set by the California Air Resources Board (ARB) in draft form by June 2010 and final by September 2010 for years 2020 and 2035.

SB 375 authorized a subregional council of governments and the county transportation commissions in the SCAG region to work together to propose the SCS and an alternative planning strategy (APS), if needed.

One of the major benefits to conducting a subregional SCS is that SCAG is required by statute to include the subregional SCS within its regional SCS to the extent that it is consistent with existing state and federal law. The Executive Director of the OCCOG, submitted a letter to the Executive Director of SCAG, Mr. Hasan Ikhrata, prior to the December 31, 2009, deadline notifying SCAG of the OCCOG and OCTA Board of Directors' (Board) actions to develop and submit a subregional SCS, dependent upon negotiating a MOU with SCAG on the terms, roles, and responsibilities for conducting a subregional SCS in Orange County.

Following five months of negotiations with SCAG on the development of the MOU, and by reaching agreement on the specific legal and technical concerns raised by the OCCOG/OCTA SCS Joint Working Committee, OCCOG and OCTA Boards, technical staff, and legal counsel, staff recommended approval of the final draft enabling Orange County to move forward with conducting a subregional SCS as authorized by SB 375.

On May 27, 2010, the OCCOG/OCTA SCS Joint Working Committee reviewed and approved a final draft of the MOU with SCAG to conduct a

Subregional Orange County SCS as authorized by SB 375. The OCCOG Board subsequently voted unanimously to approve the document and the OCTA Board of Directors approved the MOU on June 14, 2010. The MOU has been signed and submitted to SCAG (Attachment A).

RFP for Orange County Subregional SCS Consultant

On Wednesday, June 16, 2010, staff released a RFP 0-1609: Consultant Services for the Development of Orange County Subregional SCS. The RFP is posted for review on the OCCOG website. The Scope of Work for the RFP was provided for review by the OCCOG/OCTA Subregional SCS Joint Working Committee and the full OCCOG Board at the meetings held on May 27, 2010.

Given the short statutory timeline to conduct the subregional and regional SCS, the intent is to have a SCS consultant selected and on board by August 1, 2010. SB 375 requires an aggressive timeline for compliance so the procurement process has been streamlined significantly to ensure that OCCOG has the consultant and resources in place in a timely manner to comply with the deliverables and milestones to comply fully with the statute.

SB 375 Clean-Up Legislation and CTC Guidelines

At the last OCCOG Board meeting, during Kristin Essner's presentation on SB 375 clean-up legislation, Director Peter Herzog requested that staff provide the relevant CTC RTP guidelines section that refers to the exemptions under SB 375 (the "programmed for funding" section). Posted below is the specific section of the CTC guidelines.

6.16 Transportation Projects Exempted from Senate Bill 375

Government Code Section 65080 (b)(2)(L) provides that projects programmed for funding on or before December 31, 2011, are not required to be subject to the provisions required in Government Code Section 65080 (b)(2), a SCS and APS, if they are:

- Contained in the 2007 or 2009 Federal Statewide Transportation Improvement Program, or
- Funded pursuant to the Highway Safety, Traffic Reduction, Air Quality, and Port Security Bond Act of 2006, Chapter 12.49 (commencing with Section 8879.20) of Division 1 of Title 2, or
- Were specifically listed in a ballot measure prior to December 31, 2008, approving a sales tax increase for transportation projects.

Nothing in Government Code Section 65080 (b)(2)(L) shall require a transportation sales tax authority to change the funding allocations approved by the voters for categories of transportation projects in a sales tax measure adopted prior to December 31, 2010. For purposes of this subparagraph of the Government Code, a transportation sales tax authority is a district, as defined in Section 7252 of the Revenue and Taxation Code that is authorized to impose a sales tax for transportation purposes.

Programmed for funding refers to the inclusion of funding in the 2007 or 2009 Federal Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (FSTIP); the approval of funding by the State Legislature or appropriate administrative agency; or the approval of funding by voters in a sales tax expenditure plan.

For the purposes of Government Code Section 65080 (b)(2)(H), prior to adopting a SCS, the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) shall quantify the reduction in greenhouse gas emissions (GHG) projected to be achieved by the SCS and set forth the difference, if any, between the amount of that reduction and the target for the region established by the ARB. As a result, an MPO shall include exempted projects in their SCS for purposes of modeling the impacts of the RTP on regional greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions. These projects, however, are exempt from the internal consistency requirement. In other words, these projects may be included in the RTP even if they are inconsistent with the SCS or other policies to reduce regional GHG emissions.

A project's status as exempt does not preclude an MPO from evaluating it for inclusion in the RTP and ultimately excluding it from the RTP at its discretion based on financial constraint, policy, or other considerations.

Recommendation: Receive and file as an information item.

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MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

BY AND BETWEEN

ORANGE COUNTY TRANSPORTATION AUTHORITY

AND

ORANGE COUNTY COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENTS

AND

THE SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA ASSOCATION OF GOVERNMENTS

FOR ORANGE COUNTY SUSTAINABLE COMMUNITIES STRATEGY

THIS MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING (hereinafter referred to as "MOU") is entered by and between the Orange County Transportation Authority, (hereinafter referred to as "AUTHORITY"), the Orange County Council of Governments, (hereinafter referred to as "OCCOG"), and the Southern California Association of Governments, (hereinafter referred to as "SCAG"), collectively referred to as the "Parties."

RECITALS:

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 375 (Chapter 728, laws of 2008, "SB 375") requires SCAG to prepare a regional Sustainable Communities Strategy (hereinafter referred to as "SCS" or "Regional SCS") as part of SCAG's Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) to achieve goals for the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions from automobiles and light trucks in the SCAG region which comprises the counties of Imperial, Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino and Ventura;

WHEREAS, SB 375 allows AUTHORITY, as the county transportation commission for Orange County, and OCCOG, as a subregional council of governments for Orange County, to develop and submit to SCAG a subregional SCS for Orange County (hereinafter referred to as "Orange County SCS");

WHEREAS, as part of its implementation of SB 375, SCAG has developed and adopted a certain "Framework and Guidelines for the Subregional Sustainable Communities Strategy" (hereinafter

referred to as "Framework and Guidelines"), attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and incorporated herein by this reference.

WHEREAS, SCAG is required by SB 375 to include a subregional SCS in the regional SCS, to the extent consistent with state and federal law, including the SCS conducted by Orange County; and

WHEREAS, AUTHORITY, OCCOG and SCAG desire to enter into this MOU to demonstrate mutual commitments to prepare the Orange County SCS.

NOW, **THEREFORE**, the Parties enter into the following MOU with respect to the matters set forth herein:

- This MOU establishes the roles, responsibilities, and requirements for AUTHORITY,
 OCCOG, and SCAG that are necessary to develop an Orange County SCS that shall be included in the regional SCS prepared by SCAG.
- 2. AUTHORITY and OCCOG shall prepare the Orange County SCS consistent with SCAG's adopted Framework and Guidelines, as attached hereto, to ensure that the region can successfully incorporate strategies within the Orange County SCS into the Regional SCS, and not inhibit the region from complying with SB 375.
- 3. AUTHORITY and OCCOG agree to comply with the Milestones Schedule, attached hereto as Exhibit "B" and incorporated by this reference, and work with SCAG and the other subregions to ensure the successful delivery of a regional SCS by using the Deliverables Template, attached hereto as Exhibit "C" and incorporated herein by this reference as the primary template for developing a subregional SCS workplan. The Deliverables Template may be subject to change, based on direction from the SCAG Regional Council or Community, Economic and Human Development Policy Committee, and approval by OCCOG.
- 4. AUTHORITY shall prepare the transportation element of the Orange County SCS through AUTHORITY'S Long-Range Transportation Plan (LRTP). Such transportation element shall, at a minimum, identify a transportation network (i.e., list of transportation projects) to service the

transportation needs of Orange County, and describe transportation policies (e.g., Transportation Demand Management and Transportation System Management strategies).

- 5. OCCOG shall prepare the Orange County SCS, and use AUTHORITY'S LRTP as the transportation element of the Orange County SCS.
- 6. OCCOG and AUTHORITY are encouraged by SCAG to conduct a public participation process in developing the Orange County SCS, above and beyond the process required for the regional SCS required under Section 65080(b)(2)(D)-(E) of the California Government Code. Further, SCAG encourages OCCOG to develop a public participation plan, similar to SCAG's Public Participation Plan adopted in December 2009, for such purposes.
- 7. OCCOG and AUTHORITY agree to participate in all publicly noticed meetings, workshops, hearings, and other outreach activities organized in Orange County by SCAG at which the regional SCS or Orange County SCS is included on the agenda. All parties shall coordinate with one another during implementation of SCAG's public participation process in order to ensure broad public and stakeholder participation, and to avoid duplication of effort.
- 8. OCCOG and AUTHORITY shall retain and deliver to SCAG all documentation pertaining to the Orange County SCS from publicly noticed meetings, workshops, and hearings at which the Orange County SCS is included on the agenda. Such documentation shall include but is not limited to meeting notices, agendas, minutes, comments and responses to comments, sign-up sheets, handouts, and copies of power point presentations.
- 9. AUTHORITY, OCCOG, and SCAG acknowledge that population, housing, and employment estimates are being prepared by the Center for Demographic Research at California State University Fullerton through the Orange County Projection process and the 2012 RTP growth forecasting process (hereinafter referred to as the "OCP dataset"). SCAG agrees to use the OCP dataset as reviewed and approved by OCCOG, for the Regional SCS and the 2012 RTP; provided, that SCAG, in consultation with OCCOG, may make adjustments to the OCP dataset in order to ensure consistency with SCAG's 2012 RTP growth forecast.

10. AUTHORITY and Orange County local agencies shall provide SCAG with population, employment, and housing estimates in transportation analysis zone (TAZ) format consistent with the Orange County Transportation Analysis Model (OCTAM).

- 11. AUTHORITY agrees to incorporate new land use-transportation interactions into OCTAM, and these shall include, at a minimum, net residential and employment densities, jobs/housing diversity, design characteristics, and destination accessibility.
- 12. The Parties agree and acknowledge that population, housing, and employment data submitted to SCAG by OCCOG and AUTHORITY shall be accurately reflected in all documentation produced by SCAG that relates to the Orange County SCS and Regional SCS.
- 13. The Parties agree and acknowledge that RHNA responsibilities shall remain with SCAG, and neither AUTHORITY nor OCCOG shall assume delegation responsibility for RHNA as part of the Orange County SCS development. However, neither AUTHORITY nor OCCOG is precluded by this MOU from assuming delegation responsibility for RHNA as part of a subsequent, separate agreement.
- 14. SCAG agrees to accept AUTHORITY's LRTP as Orange County's program of transportation projects as input for the 2012 Regional Transportation Plan.
- 15. SCAG agrees to acknowledge that the Renewed Measure M program is exempt from SB 375 requirements, to the extent consistent with SB 375 and the final, adopted California Transportation Commission RTP guidelines.
- 16. SCAG agrees that in addition to preparation of the Orange County SCS developed under this MOU, development of an Alternative Planning Strategy (APS) by AUTHORITY and OCCOG is optional. This understanding shall not preclude SCAG from preparing a regional APS pursuant to SB 375.
 - 17. SCAG shall not develop SCS related targets that are attributable to the subregions.
- 18. SCAG agrees that it will not impose a penalty on the Orange County subregion if the greenhouse gas targets, as established by the California Air Resources Board, are not met by the Regional SCS.

- SCAG shall accept the Orange County SCS prepared in accordance with this MOU, as the
 Orange County subregion's input into the Regional SCS prepared by SCAG.
- 20. AUTHORITY, OCCOG, and SCAG shall separately amend this MOU in writing or develop a separate, mutual funding agreement addressing Orange County SCS costs should state or federal funding become available that can be applied toward preparation of the Orange County SCS.
- 21. AUTHORITY, OCCOG, and SCAG agree to work closely together throughout the regional SCS process and Orange County SCS process to provide technical input, applicable planning data, and constructive feedback with respect to all documents, products and deliverables developed and associated with the Orange County SCS.
- 22. The AUTHORITY, OCCOG, and SCAG agree to work together in good faith, using reasonable efforts to resolve any unforeseen issues and disputes arising out of the performance of this MOU.
- 23. The Parties agree in good faith to provide the resources necessary to implement the provisions of the MOU.
- 24. AUTHORITY, OCCOG, and SCAG agree to defend, indemnify and hold harmless the other parties, their Officers, agents, elected officials, and employees, from all liability, claims, losses and demands, including defense costs and reasonable attorneys' fees, whether resulting from court action or otherwise, arising out of the acts or omissions of the defending party, its officers, agents, or employees, in the performance of the MOU. When acts or omissions of one party are directed by another party, the party directing the acts or omission shall owe this defense and indemnity obligation to the agencies following the directions. The provisions of this paragraph shall survive termination of this MOU.
- 25. This MOU shall be governed by all applicable federal, state, and local laws. The signatories warrant that in the performance of this MOU, each shall comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws, statutes and ordinances and all lawful orders, rules and regulations promulgated there under.

 26. This MOU may only be modified or amended upon written mutual consent of all signatories. All modifications, amendments, changes and revisions of this MOU in whole or part, and from time to time, shall be binding upon the parties, so long as the same shall be in writing and executed by the signatories.

- 27. This MOU, including all exhibits and documents incorporated herein and made applicable by reference, constitutes the complete and exclusive statement of the term(s) and condition(s) of the agreement between the parties and it supersedes all prior representations, understandings and communications. The invalidity in whole or part of any term or condition of this MOU shall not affect the validity of the other term(s) or condition(s).
- 28. Any party may withdraw from this MOU upon 30 days written notice to the other, until the due date set forth in Exhibit "B" for submittal to SCAG of the preliminary Orange County SCS. After such due date, any party may withdraw from this MOU only upon mutual written agreement by all Parties.
- 29. Each signatory shall be excused from performing its obligations under this MOU during the time and to the extent that it is prevented from performing by an unforeseeable cause beyond its control, including but not limited to: any incident of fire, flood; acts of God; commandeering of material, produces, plants or facilities by federal, state or local government; national fuel shortage; or a material act or omission by any other party; when satisfactory evidence of such cause is presented to the other parties, and provided further such nonperformance is unforeseeable, beyond the control and is not due to the fault or negligence of the party not performing.
- 30. Any notice sent by first class mail, postage paid, to the address and addressee, shall be deemed to have been given when in the ordinary course it would be delivered. The representatives of the parties who are primarily responsible for the administration of this MOU, and to whom notices, demands and communications shall be given are as detailed in Exhibit "D". If there are any changes in the names and/or addresses listed in Exhibit "D", the party desiring to make such changes shall give a written notice to the other respective parties within five (5) days of such change.

31. Summary Discussion and Action Minutes

Meeting of May 4, 2010

The OCCOG Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) meeting of May 4, 2010 was called to order by Chair Marika Modugno, City of Orange, City Hall, Conference Room C, 300 East Chapman, Orange, California, at 9:06 A.M. Attendees were invited by the Chair to introduce themselves. The list of meeting attendees is attached.

PUBLIC COMMENT:

There were no public comments.

ADMINISTRATION

1. OCCOG TAC Meeting Minutes

The minutes were moved for approval by Pat Dapkus, City of Huntington Beach, to approve and a second by Melanie McCann, City of Santa Ana, followed by the TAC unanimously approving the minutes of April 6, 2010.

PRESENTATIONS, DISCUSSION AND ACTION ITEMS, REPORTS

2. Orange County Projections (OCP 2010)

The TAC membership received the report on the status of this effort and the data due to CDR on April 30, 2010:

- OCP-2010 data feedback
- Residential development on vacant land map info (if applicable)
- BMP list

Ms. Diep reminded attendees that local input data for OCP-2010 was due on Friday, April 30, 2010. She provided a summary of the information provided to each jurisdiction and asked for all comments to be submitted as soon as possible. The information on residential development on vacant land is due as well. She shared that the Department of Finance (DOF) has released revised population numbers for all Counties and Cities for 2001-2010. The Orange County Projections 2010 population numbers will be adjusted down to reflect the lower numbers for the area. Ms. Diep went over the Best Management Project list stating that it gives Orange County a resource of planned or built projects which contribute to the goal of reducing Green House Gases. The list was compiled using examples from various sources, including SCAG. Contact Scott Martin at CDR if you have questions on the BMPs.

3. Orange County Sustainable Communities Strategy (SCS) Development

A report on the following items was given by David Simpson, OCCOG staff:

- ♦ MOU Development Status
- ♦ OCCOG/OCTA SCS Joint Working Committee April 24, 2010 Meeting
- ♦ Orange County SCS Timeline
- Orange County SCS Next Steps Development of a work plan, scope of work, Board meeting discussion

Mr. Simpson explained that Kristine Murray, OCCOG Executive Director, was on her way to attend our meeting. He gave us an update on the fiscal audit for OCCOG. He has researched back to 2006 to examine the financial issues of the COG. The goal is to clear up the financial issues from the Caltrans request so to use the funds the COG has on hold as the funding source for crafting the Orange County SCS. These funds have been frozen for some time. Once this issue is resolved, the OCCOG will be able to apply for additional transportation federal grants for related efforts for this project. Time is quickly passing so we need to move fast so to get the Orange County SCS underway. Given the accelerated time line required for development of the Memorandum of Understanding between OCCOG/OCTA and SCAG and the overall development of the Orange County SCS, OCCOG staff suggested the creation of an ad-hoc working group that is comprised of 6 to 7 TAC members. The purpose of the ad-hoc working group would be to review and provide feedback on issues related to the MOU and the SCS that are time sensitive and will not be available to be reviewed by the entire TAC. The adhoc OCCOG TAC SCS working group would only convene when it is infeasible to take the issue to the TAC and the ad-hoc working group would represent the interests of the TAC as a whole if called upon.

Mr. Simpson covered in greater detail the remaining issues connected with the MOU (between OCCOG and SCAG) on the implementation of Orange County strategy which will be folding into the SCAG SCS.

Ms. Murray joined the meeting at 9:20 am and added to the discussion her insights on the on the SCS process and the MOU.

Several key items were included in the language of the MOU which include:

- Methodologies related to the modeling of growth
- Inclusion of Measure M projects
- Framework for SCS guidelines

As of last Friday it looks to us that it is ready to go. We do need to clean up some items (Schedule C) in the MOU.

A TAC member asked Ms. Murray her thoughts on what local agencies may need to provide in terms of work product for the OC SCS. Ms. Murray answered that OCCOG staff is not sure yet what those details will be. OCCOG staff will have to work toward determining that task as the process moves forward. There is \$200,000 of federal dollars that OCCOG plans to tap into for the funding of this effort once the Caltrans issues related to COG financial practices are resolved. OCCOG staff expects that to be completed in the next month. Mr. Simpson is working with Caltrans staff in Sacramento to finish this work as soon as possible.

Chair Marika Modugno provided more details about the proposal to establish an OCCOG-TAC ad-hoc SCS Working group. The group discussed this suggestion and fleshed out its purpose. Doug Reilly, City of Laguna Woods; Marika Modugno, City of Irvine; Heather Allen, City of Fullerton; Tracy Sato, City of Anaheim; Art Bashmakian, City Westminster; Deborah Diep, Center for Demographic Research; and Greg Nord, OCTA all volunteered to serve on this group if the membership establishes it. Additional discussion occurred with Doug Reilly, City of Laguna Woods, moving and Tracy Sato, City of Anaheim, providing a second to establish such a group to look at the policy level decisions and technical issues related to this Orange County SCS effort which was approved by those in attendance.

Ms. Murray shared that Exhibit C of the OCCOG/SCAG MOU is also off the table at this time. There is the likelihood of a heavy work load on this effort and for the local jurisdictions, and those agencies should look ahead to plan for this program. Chair Modugno and Tracy Sato, City of Anaheim, commented on a number of technical challenges on how to update your land use categories.

Ms. Murray further explained that the Scope of Work for the SCS and awarding the contract is anticipated to be in about 30 days. The joint working committee of the OCCOG Board and OCTA board committee may need to review and approve the contract. The estimated cost of the SCS is 1.5 million with a 12 month effort anticipated. The initial award of \$250,000 is part of the plan to get a RFP out so to get things going. Ms. Sato asked about this funding source and the calculating of resources to complete this work. The implementation of this effort was covered in greater in depth. The role of CDR for the project and inclusion of OCTA's LRTP in the data for the project was also discussed.

<u>Action:</u> TAC created an Ad-Hoc Sustainable Communities Strategy (SCS) OCCOG TAC Working Group consisting of the following members:

Doug Reilly, City of Laguna Woods; Marika Modugno, City of Irvine; Heather Allen, City of Fullerton; Tracy Sato, City of Anaheim; Art Bashmakian, City of Westminster; Deborah Diep, Center for Demographic Research; and Greg Nord, OCTA.

4. SCAG meetings

- ♦ Regional Conference and General Assembly May 5-7, 2010
- ◆ Plans and Programs TAC Meeting of April 14, 2010

Mr. Simpson gave the report on the upcoming SCAG meetings. Several TAC members conveyed they would be going to the General Assembly.

One of the topics at the meeting will be an amendment to the by-laws that would allow Transportation Agencies to become SCAG members.

Some of the other items slated for discussion include:

- Selecting alternates to policy level data for the SCS from the Plans and Programs Committee from SCAG.
- Election of new SCAG officers.
- SCAG will roll out its proposal to CARB for GHG targets for the SCAG region.
- ◆ The Plans and Programs TAC at SCAG will meet on this. The deadline to comment on the SCAG targets is May 24 2010. (It was noted that ABAG or SCANDAG may not submit targets for their region to CARB).
- We will hear more about this topic from CARB as they will be holding another Target setting meeting next week (May 10). This is something to watch for and could provide direction as to what the % or per capita reduction expected for the SCAG region will be.

Mr. Simpson shared that we continue to watch Senate Bill 518 – there is no change or movement of this bill since last month, but we will keep watch on it. The bill has costs associated with it (parking is not free). This is a two year bill. The League of Cities has recently taken action to be not support this bill.

5. OCTA's Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP)

- ◆ Transit Strategy
- ♦ LRTP Goals and Objective

Greg shared that the Board has approved the transit policy for the LTRP.

The LTRP is the vision document for transportation for Orange County. It forecasts transportation needs and projects to 2035. On April 26, OCTA staff took the goals of the program to the OCTA Board and received their approval.

The main priority is to re-establish the service levels of 2008 into the transit service. The demand for new transit connection is a county goal as we know our community is aging with the 65+ years segment being the fastest growing age group of the region. It is safe to assume that the goals of SB 375 (and the SCS) will put more emphasis on local transit efforts as it reduces vehicle trips and miles traveled. The transit strategy would include more focus on BRT stations and more bus service overall. The staff report given to the OCTA Board and the map of service areas was shared with the TAC membership. Some of the highlights of the plan are to link bus and transit service to each other and to focus on these high service areas which connect to Metro links stations. The plan is now out for public review and OCTA welcomes comments from local jurisdictions. The year 2008 is the highest year of service and the LRTP will focus on maintaining these services as the years ahead occur. A top goal of the plan is to approve the 15 minutes head way service levels for bus connections. This plan is not constrained by funding. Additional details on this effort will be sent via email to all OC City Managers in the next couple of days.

6. SCAG 2012 Regional Transportation Plan and Growth Forecast

SCAG's Sustainability Tool Training

The Chair asked members about participation in last week's training sessions in Orange County for this SCAG tool. She asked for feedback on the tool and its benefits or challenges. A discussion followed.

The challenge with the two sessions was that the real data base/module was not working so it was difficult to really get the full benefits of the tool. There was a glitch in linking to the SCAG network to see the program live. The consensus of the members felt the training gave attendees a sense of how the program worked and found that you don't need a GIS background to work with the tool. Direct guidance to comprehend the program was required. It is a tool local agencies can use to update/correct the errors in SCAG's database (existing land uses could be wrong) as the program moves to a web-based format. The afternoon session had additional challenges.

Ms. Sato, City of Anaheim, will work with SCAG staff get the tool running at Anaheim City Hall before another training opportunity is scheduled at one of the training rooms in the City of Anaheim. If SCAG is unsuccessful in getting the Sustainability Tool to work, a session will not be scheduled. Converting the program to a web version is what SCAG is working on now.

7. OCCOG Board Meeting of April 22, 2010

Mr. Simpson reiterated a brief summary on the crating of the SCS and the MOU (see item X for more details). The Board reviewed the list of active State legislation and discussed the suspension of AB 32 due to recession. The legislation list was attached to the TAC agenda for reference. The MOU for 2011 to contract with CDR on demographic work is on the next Board agenda.

OCTA staff is looking to update and relocate the OCCOG website (yes we have one) to make it more accessible.

8. Update on SCAQMD's Proposed Rule 2301

Ms. Sato reported that no new action has occurred on this topic in April. The new rule is anticipated to be released this summer. She will continue to monitor it and report any changes or meetings at future TAC meetings.

Fern Nueno, City of Newport Beach, shared information on a transportation document related to sustainability. It covers the full range of strategies available to reduce transportation's greenhouse gas emissions, from more efficient vehicle technologies to better ways of operating our transportation system. The document called *Transportation's Role in Reducing U.S. Greenhouse Gas Emissions* was written by the US Department of Transportation. Ms. Nueno

added that the study included useful land use discussion that TAC membership might wish to review.
